Self-Help Groups

According to our latest MarkeTrak VIII publication on best practices and their relationship to successful hearing aid user outcomes (Hearing Review, 11/2010), only 2% of experienced and new users of hearing aids were referred to a self-help or peer-support group by their hearing health professional. When we first saw this figure it was a shocker.

At BHI we believe that counseling in all of its many forms is critical to a successful consumer journey with hearing aids. As a means of stimulating more referrals to self-help groups, especially for new users, we invited America's expert on peer-support groups, Brenda Battat, Executive Director of Hearing Loss Association of America (HLAA), to write a consumer piece on the value of self-help groups for inclusion in our BHI portfolio on Aural Education.

In her article, titled "Regaining Control of Your Life through Self-Help Groups," Brenda discusses the importance of self-help groups in providing counseling and learning and sharing about hearing loss/solution issues. She ends with 12 reasons why self-help groups are good for you, which are repeated here.

Twelve Reasons Why Self-help Groups are Good for You

Self-help groups:

Provide a community of people with hearing loss who understand and are empathic to your unique problems.

Help you deal with the issues of hearing loss stigma.

Will help you understand your legal rights as a person with a hearing disability.

Will teach you coping and communication strategies.

Will help you to adjust and communicate your needs in a "hearing" workplace.

Will share technologies beyond your hearing aids that will enhance your ability to function in the world.

Will educate you on technologies and strategies for ensuring your safety.

Will show you how to stay tuned into family conversations.

Will suggest strategies for communicating in noisy situations.

Will show you how to accommodate your hearing loss while traveling.

Will empower you through exchange of knowledge, encouragement and the sharing of experiences.

Will alleviate the despair and isolation of hearing loss through their support.

Folate May Reduce or Delay Hearing Loss

Low blood levels of folate are associated with a 35% increased risk of hearing loss, according to a study from Australia. Folate is the natural source of vitamin B9. The study strengthens the link between B-vitamins and hearing. Researchers at the University of Sydney have examined blood levels of folate, vitamin B12, and homocysteine and correlated this with the risk of age-related hearing loss.

The data showed that folate levels below 11 nanomoles per litre were associated with a 34% increased risk of age-related hearing loss. In addition, levels of homocysteine over 20 micromoles per litre were associated with a 64% increase in the risk of hearing loss. The study was based on a population of 2,956 people aged 50 and over.

HLA-PA Sponsors Scholarship to the Hearing Loss Association of America Convention:

HLA-PA has established a scholarship to assist Pennsylvania residents who are HLAA members to attend the HLAA convention. One scholarship will be available for a deserving person who has never attended an HLAA convention and is currently involved with hearing loss issues. The HLA-PA Advisory Council's Scholarship Committee will select the qualifying applicant.

When and where is the 2011 HLAA convention? The convention will be June 16-19, 2011 (four days, three nights) at the Hyatt Regency Crystal City, Arlington, VA.

Who eligible scholarship is as а candidate? Any Pennsylvania resident with hearing loss, regardless of age, is eligible. The applicant must be a current HLAA member and have never attended an HLAA convention. He she must or demonstrated an interest in remaining actively involved with hearing loss issues and must indicate that a scholarship would enable his or her attendance at an HLAA convention.

Scholarship amount: The recipient will be awarded \$500 (to be applied to transportation, lodging, and meals) plus the cost of registration for the full-activity convention package (includes banquet). Any amount exceeding \$500 will be his or her responsibility. The awardee must attend the convention or return the \$500.

Submission date: Application forms may be emailed or mailed (email preferred if possible). Deadline for receipt is April 30, 2011. For more information, contact Russ Green, HLA-PA Scholarship Chair, at scholarship@hla-pa.org or 106 Mountainview Dr., Chesterbrook, PA 19087-5532.
