Do you enjoy learning? Would you like the opportunity to take free online courses from professors at leading



universities, with the option of turning on English subtitles? If so, check out the numerous MOOCs (massive open online courses) offered at www.coursera.org, The courses vary in length from several weeks to a full semester, and you determine how you want to participate. You can just watch the videos or you can also download the provided readings, and you can even obtain statements of accomplishment by doing assignments, taking quizzes, and participating in online discussion boards. Information provided for each course indicates approximately how many hours a week are needed to complete everything.

Coursera was started two years ago and has seven million participants. I recently took a fascinating course on social psychology conducted by an engaging Wesleyan professor. Interestingly, the main readings for this course are chapters selected from two psychology textbooks written by Dr. David Myers, whom many HLAA folks will recognize as a leading proponent of looping and a former HLAA convention keynote speaker. Coursera covers many fields, with a particular emphasis on health, humanities and social science. EdX (www.edx.org) is a similar free MOOC program with subtitled courses that was also started in 2012. It's owned by Harvard and MIT and has 2.5 million users.

There's no easier way to quench your thirst for knowledge than through one of these free and accessible programs!

New App Lets Deaf People 'Hear' Group Conversations

Researchers have developed the first mobile app to make group conversations possible between deaf people and their hearing peers. The Transcense app "listens" and interprets conversations, providing real-time captioning on mobile devices. The app was developed by researchers from Berkeley, along with University of San Francisco graduates from the US, France, the Netherlands, and Taiwan.

Transcense connects multiple smartphones belonging to conversation participants in a room and leverages their microphones so the app can "listen" to those speaking. A hearing impaired person can also use the app to respond and get the attention of a group by using a personalized digital voice. "It's a really fantastic development, to just be included, and feel included," said Josephine Schallehn of the Hearing Loss Association. "Every day, 360 million people are left out from group conversations because of hearing loss," said the developers. "We thought we could do better." The researchers say they have consulted over 300 people - including audiologists, deaf and hard of hearing people, and seniors, as well as speech and behavioral design experts – to help them with their research. They are currently raising money on Indiegogo to bring the innovative app to market.

Diana Bender HLAA National Convention Scholarship

The Hearing Loss Association of America Pennsylvania State Office (HLAA-PA) has established the Diana Bender HLAA National Convention Scholarship to assist Pennsylvania residents who are members of the Hearing Loss Association of America to attend the HLAA convention. (Note that membership in a chapter is not the same as membership in HLAA; the latter is required for scholarship eligibility.) One scholarship will be available for a deserving person who is currently involved with hearing loss issues. The HLAA-PA Advisory Council's Scholarship Committee will select the qualifying applicant.

When and where is the 2015 HLAA convention? The convention will be June 25-28 (four days, three nights) at the St. Louis Station Hotel in St. Louis, Missouri.

Who is eligible as a scholarship candidate? Any Pennsylvania resident with hearing loss, regardless of age is eligible, as long as he or she meets the following qualifications. The applicant must be a current HLAA member, must have demonstrated an interest in remaining actively involved with hearing loss issues, and must indicate that a scholarship would enable his or her attendance. Preference will be given to those who have never attended an HLAA convention.

Scholarship amount: The recipient will be awarded \$500 (to be applied to transportation, lodging, and meals) plus the cost of registration for the full-activity convention package (includes banquet). Any amount exceeding \$500 will be his or her responsibility. The awardee must attend the convention or return the \$500.

Submission date: Application forms may be mailed or emailed (email preferred if possible). Deadline for receipt is <u>March 23, 2015</u>.
